Public Hearing (Continued) Proposed Local Law 5-2022 Amend Chapter 151 - Noise

- C. Kenney made a motion to continue the public hearing for Proposed Local Law 5-2022 (PLL5-2022) at 7:07 p.m. Seconded by C. Swartz. 4 Ayes 0 Noes. **MOTION CARRIED.** Ayes M. Kenney, S. Swartz, T. Rex, C. Peter. Noes 0.
- S. Peter noted that several residents had expressed concerns at the previous meeting, as well as visited him in his office regarding the definition of an unreasonable noise. C. Rex also asked for clarification. Others had questioned the penalties as listed in §151-2. As it read, fines ranged from \$350.00 to \$1,000.00, along with the possibility of imprisonment. Upon review of the noise ordinances from The Town of Sand Lake and City of Rensselaer, the board was considering removing imprisonment and only imposing a monetary penalty. A fee structure would need to be established. He felt that \$350.00 for a first offense was a bit high and recommended a lower starting point with a penalty of \$500.00 for a third offense. Atty. Langlois agreed that removing imprisonment would be wise.

Public Comment: D. Kelly (227 Shufelt Road) asked if the board would set the penalties by local law or by resolution. Atty. Langlois noted that as the ordinance was being amended by local law, so would the penalties. To set the penalties by resolution would be far more difficult and more difficult to prosecute. S. Peter agreed that the penalties should be included in the local law.

- G. Fiedler (2333 Payne Road) expressed his support of the law and said he had reviewed the noise ordinance for the City of Albany, which included the verbiage of a "person of reasonable sensitivity" to refer to someone affected by a disruptive noise. He felt it would be a good addition to the law, as well as including mowers under §151-1B(5).
- V. Feldman (2342 Payne Road) said she was confused by §131 and asked if it would be replacing §151. S. Peter clarified that §131 was the noise ordinance for the City of Rensselaer and was merely an example. She understood and expressed concern that the proposed §151 contained unreasonable terms leaving it open for interpretation. She recommended that a separate acknowledgement be included for businesses.
- G. Fiedler (2333 Payne Road) agreed with Ms. Feldman regarding businesses. He felt they should be held to a different standard, with respect to fines. He stated that a business would be less affected than a homeowner by a fine of \$350.00. S. Peter said it would not necessarily be the business or homeowner held responsible for noises but rather the person(s) causing the issue.
- D. Kelly (227 Shufelt Road) added that a DJ, rather than a venue should be held responsible for noise as they are in control of the volume and bass.
- G. Fiedler (2333 Payne Road) asked if §151-1B(6) was necessary as it was already a state

law. S. Peter said the state law only covered a registered vehicle. This section would apply to off road vehicles and lawn mowers.

Board Comment: C. Rex said standards would help everyone understand the scope of the law.

Upon hearing no further public comment, a motion was made by C. Swartz to close the public hearing at 7:25 p.m. Seconded by C. Kenney.

Open Discussion

Highway Truck Purchase: S. Peter said B. Brahm, Interim Highway Superintendent, was informed that the new truck which had been ordered is no longer available. There was an alternative truck, with the same body but different motor, available but at an increased cost. The price would increase from \$242,581.00 to \$255,339.00. S. Peter asked the board for their approval of the change. All board members agreed.

Road Program Update: S. Peter noted that for the 2022 season, surface treatments were applied to the following: Boyce Road, East Hill Road, Garrison Hill Road, Hoags Corners Road, Old Post Road South, Rohloff Road, McClellan Road and Sultan Lane. The following roads received a hot-mix asphalt overlay: Bellwood Lane, Clearview Boulevard, Park Place, Crescent Drive, Michael Road, Lakeside Drive, Champagne Drive, Hillcrest Avenue, Castleridge Road, Ridgeview Circle, Schuurman Road (from Routes 9 & 20 to Town Hall entrance), Washington Avenue, Lake Shore Drive, Rensselaer Avenue, Lincoln Avenue, Albany Avenue, Bayberry Drive and Holly Lane.

Wingman – Highway Department: S. Peter informed the board that B. Brahm had received several applications and felt they would be fully staffed for the winter season.

Auctions: S. Peter said a resolution would be needed in the future to authorize several items from the Town Hall and Highway Garage to be placed on Auctions International.

Fitness Grants: S. Peter said he would be meeting with the National Fitness Coalition regarding grants for fitness equipment at the town park. The equipment would be similar to the Viking Gym but be constructed out of metal rather than wood.

Building at the Transfer station: B. Goodall stated that the slab was complete and the building had been moved back to its original location. The slab raised the building six inches above the pavement, allowing water to run off.

Executive Session

C. Swartz made a motion at 7:31 p.m. to enter into an Executive Session of the board pursuant to Public Officers Law, Article 7, §105(e). Seconded by C. Kenney.
