Supervisor Peter called the June 8, 2023 Town Board Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance and dispensed with roll call. All present as noted above.

S. Peter asked to deviate from the agenda to consider a resolution honoring Ethan Maier on being awarded the rank of Eagle Scout.

WHEREAS, Ethan is a senior at Maple Hill High School, where he is a member of the Wrestling Team, and will be attending UAlbany this fall to study Emergency Preparedness, Cybersecurity & Homeland Security, and

WHEREAS, Ethan participated in Drama Club and is an active volunteer with Kiwanis.

Following the resolution vote, Rensselaer County Legislator W. Gendron presented Ethan with a proclamation for his achievements. A brief recess followed.

Public Hearing Battisti Water District #10, Cost of Improvements Amendment

C. Bult made a motion to open the public hearing for the proposed Battisti Water District #10 at 7:07 p.m. The motion was seconded by C. Kenney.

The Town Clerk summarized the Affidavit of Publication seeking public comment to consider increasing the maximum cost of the improvements for Battisti Water District No. 10 to

\$2,735,010.00 pursuant to Section 209-h of the Town Law of the State of New York. The legal notice was posted on the Town Clerk's signboard on May 19, 2023 as well as on the Town's website and published in *The Record* on May 22, 2023.

R. Laberge stated that the purpose of the public hearing was to increase the maximum expense for the construction of Battisti Water District No. 10. He followed with a brief background on the formation of the district which included a map, plan and report which outlined four scenarios for cost to the residents, based upon the receipt of grant funding. Thankfully, the district was able to obtain three funding sources, including the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), NY Water Grant and American Rescue Plan Act funds (ARPA). He noted that the CDBG and NY Water Grant funding was higher than projected, allowing the decrease in the total cost to the district users. He added that construction had begun on the project, following the bidding process; however, a requirement of the NY Water Grant was to have a revised bond resolution to reflect the loan cost of \$376,010.00.

Atty. Ryan explained that a petition had been filed by the residents of the Battisti Water District following the abandonment of said district by the previous owner. In the map, plan and report that was subsequently created by the Laberge Group, the capital costs for the project and operations and maintenance exceeded the threshold allowance as set by the NYS Comptroller requiring the town to apply for approval and seek funding to offset. Once the district was created and grant funding was received the town now needed, under Town Law

§ 209-h, to make a new application due to the increased cost of the project, even though the total cost for the first year to residents of the district would decrease from \$1,040.00 to \$651.00. He added that the action was subject to permissive referendum. If a petition is not received within thirty days of the notice being published, the action can then be approved.

Carol Rochester of 27 Orchard Road asked if the cost will increase after the first year. Atty. Ryan explained that, under Town Law Articles 12 and 12A, the map, plan and report is required to outline the first-year costs; however, they typically decrease after that. R. Laberge added that if the district needed to borrow money to make further improvements in the future, the cost may change. As for the operations and maintenance (O&M) costs, the district would be buying water from the Clearview Water District which could potentially increase based upon the cost of water and personnel. In the event others join the district, a decrease could also be seen. Ms. Rochester asked why the district could not use the well field that was owned by Mr. Keller, rather than buy water from Clearview. R. Laberge said the well field was assessed and it did not have adequate pressure. It was the most economical decision to connect to Clearview, which had adequate pressure and would allow for the installation of fire hydrants. He added that the system would have two connections, one on Van Hoesen Road and one on Route 9. This would create a loop system in which, in the event of a water main break, water could be fed from a different direction.

Brandon Lapp of 1625 Van Hoesen Road asked if the residents would be responsible for the cost of the meters and pressure valves. R. Laberge said in the original map, plan and report, the homeowner was responsible for the \$900.00 to install meter and pressure reduction valve to protect the plumbing within the home; however, due to the funding received, the cost was absorbed by the project. He added that American Evergreen would coordinate with residents for the installation of the new service line from the new shut-off valve and copper service. He noted that four homes located on Van Hoesen Road had their service come into their homes from the back of their property, running through the back yards of neighbors. As this posed a major legal issue of property line, it was decided that those services would be rerouted to the front of the homes on Van Hoesen Road.

Hearing no further board or public comments, C. Bult made a motion to close the public hearing at 7:28 p.m. Seconded by C. Kenney. All in favor.

Public Hearing Proposed Local Law 8-2023 Amend Chapter 151 - Noise

C. Swartz made a motion to open the public hearing for proposed local law #8-2023 to order at 7:28 p.m. Seconded by C. Rex. All in favor.

The Town Clerk summarized the Affidavit of Publication seeking public comment on Proposed Local Law No. 8 of 2023 Amending Chapter 151 entitled Noise in the Town of Schodack. The legal notice was posted on the Town Clerk's signboard and the Town's website on May 29, 2023 as well as published in *The Record* on May 31, 2023.

S. Peter explained that he had worked with counsel to create the latest draft of the Noise Ordinance, which included language from the Town of Colonie code. The law included general prohibition as well as decibel levels for certain situations, allowing authorities to enforce the law.

Hearing no board or public comments, C. Kenney made a motion to close the public hearing at 7:30 p.m. Seconded by C. Bult. All in favor.

Review of Resolutions

S. Peter gave a brief overview of the resolutions on the agenda. He explained that resolution 2023-201 was added to oppose proposed legislation amending the election law to require local elections to move to an even year. Following approval, the Town Clerk would be directed to forward certified copies of the resolution to Governor Hochul, Senator Ashby and Assemblyman Bendett. All other resolutions were self-explanatory.

Board Comment: S. Peter stated that due to rising costs for tire disposal and individuals bringing tires from commercial businesses to the Transfer Station, an amendment to the 2023 Rules and Regulations was deemed necessary (2023-197). The change would limit the number of tires allowed to be brought annually to the facility by a resident. He added that future discussion would be needed regarding the fee for tires. C. Swartz asked the definition of a "dirty tire". B. Goodall explained that the company who takes the tires instituted the rule as some tires were coming in with soil and rocks. If the Transfer Station took said tires, it would be their responsibility to clean them before the company would accept them. C. Bult asked if the amendment would help to address the issue at the Transfer Station. B. Goodall said yes. He noted that, at times, truck loads of tires had come in, swamping his staff. This would eliminate that.

C. Bult questioned why the audit reports had not been sent to the board for resolution 2023-195. P. Harter apologized as he thought it had been. He noted that there were no issues found and procedures were being followed by the Building Department and Town Clerk's Office. C. Bult asked if there was any urgency in passing the resolution as he would like to review the reports prior to voting. P. Harter said no. It was the consensus of the board to withdraw resolution 2023-195.

Public Comment: None.

WHEREAS, in connection with the increase in the maximum cost of the improvements for Battisti Water District No. 10 the Laberge Group, Ltd., competent engineers, prepared an addendum to the original map, plan and report; and

WHEREAS, within the original map, plan and report filed in connection with the creation of Battisti Water District No. 10, the annual user costs for the typical property equaled \$696; and

WHEREAS, although the maximum cost of the improvements has increased to \$2,735,010, the first year annual cost for the typical property within Battisti Water District No. 10 is decreasing from \$696 to \$651; and

WHEREAS, the current threshold amount established by the New York State Office of the State Comptroller for the creation of water districts or extensions does not require Comptroller approval if the first year annual costs to the typical property is less than \$1040; and

WHEREAS, despite the increase in cost to the improvements the proposed first year annual cost of \$651 to the typical property owner within Battisti Water District No. 10 is less than the threshold amount of \$1040 established by the Office of the State Comptroller; and

WHEREAS, the town board of the Town of Schodack scheduled a public hearing pursuant to Section 209-h of the Town Law to be held on June 8, 2023 at 7:05 p.m. at Schodack Town Hall, 265 Schuurman Road, Castleton, New York 12033; and
